## Phase 3 - June 8th Changes

Re-Open Saskatchewan Plan

Certain services were opened on [May 18th](#), and going forward more will be opening. The following summary is tentative, you should be keeping an eye on [saskatchewan.ca/covid19](https://saskatchewan.ca/covid19) for any changes to the Re-Open Saskatchewan Plan.

**Through all phases, the following should be considered:**

- Protective measures for vulnerable populations.
- Individuals should continue working from home if they can do so effectively.

- Physical distancing must be maintained, wherever possible.
- People must stay at home when they are sick.
- Vulnerable individuals, such as seniors and those with underlying health conditions, should continue to exercise caution and minimize high-risk exposures, such as public outings.
- Personal hygiene will continue to be a key prevention measure.
- Enhanced cleaning and disinfection should take place in workplaces, public spaces and recreational facilities.
- Although the public health order regarding the size of gatherings does not apply to businesses and workplaces, they are expected to follow the recommended public health measures, including:
  - physical distancing for staff and clients;
  - regular cleaning and disinfection;
  - frequent handwashing and sanitizing;
  - use of PPE where available and appropriate; and
  - keeping staff who demonstrate or report COVID-19 symptoms out of the workplace.
- Special care and personal care homes must ensure that each staff member works in only one facility

**For June 8th, the province's plan is to reopen the following:**

- restaurants and licensed establishments at 50 per cent capacity,
- gyms and fitness facilities,
- child care facilities,
- places of worship,
- other personal service business including: esthetician, tattoo artist, make-up application, electrologist, manicurist, pedicurist, sun tanning parlour, facilities in which body piercing, bone grafting or scarification services are provided, and other personal service facilities.

**Other than in an allowable business, the size of public and private gatherings will increase to a maximum of 15 people indoors and 30 people outdoors.**

# Great Blue Heron Provincial Park

Update from the Provincial Park

- Hiking trails are open at Anglin Lake and Valleyview. Washrooms and picnic shelters are closed, so bring hand sanitizer and be sure to pack out what you pack in. The Tower Cabin at Anglin Lake will remain closed this season due to Covid-19 restrictions.
- All park boat launches at Murray Point, Anglin subdivision, Jacobsen Bay and Anderson Point will be open June 1st.
- Fish filleting facilities at all park boat launches and Anglin bridge will remain closed, until further notice.
- Please remember to practice physical distancing when using park trails and boat launches.
- Picnic shelters, playgrounds and beaches are closed at this time.
- Some public washrooms are open. The service center (shower house) is presently closed.
- Murray Point and Anderson Point campgrounds will open **June 1<sup>st</sup>**. Spruce River and Anglin North group camping areas and associated facilities are closed at this time.

- Unfortunately, all special events and interpretive programming have been cancelled for the season. For interactive park programming, checkout the [SaskParks Facebook page](#) for daily programming.

## What's New? - Park Entry Permits now required

Starting **June 1, 2020** park entry permit are required for all vehicles entering Great Blue Heron Prov Park, which includes the following locations:

- Murray Point campgrounds,
- Murray Point day-use area and beach,
- Murray Point boat launch,
- Valleyview Trails,
- Spruce River Campground,

- Anglin Bridge,
- Jacobsen Bay boat launch and Land of the Loon Resort,
- Anglin Channel boat launch,
- Anderson Point Campground,
- North Anglin Campground.

**Do residents require a permit to access their private cottages/homes within the park?**

Cottage subdivisions at Murray Point and Anglin Lake are exempted from the park, so a park permit is not required to access these areas. Hwy 953 and 263 are also exempted from the park boundary.

**Do park entry fees apply to First Nation and Metis community members?**

Park entry fees do not apply to members of First Nation and Metis communities when they enter parkland to exercise Treaty and Aboriginal rights.

**Do seniors get a free park entry permit?**

Yes, under current legislation, Saskatchewan Seniors are able to obtain a daily or weekly park permit for free.

**Where do I get a park entry permit?**

Park entry permits are available for purchase at the Murray Point campground office. Annual park passes can also be purchased at Full Circle Gas and Convenience, Northside.

**What are park entry fees used for?**

Park entry fees support park operations, infrastructure and programs. The boat launches, trails, picnic areas and day-use facilities are maintained and improved with the funds generated through sales of park entry permits.

Keep your trash in a secure location until garbage pickup day. **Do not leave your bin out if you are leaving before garbage day**, instead dispose of your trash to the bear-proof bins or haul it to the transfer station.

The District of Lakeland has traps to catch skunks and for safety reasons we won't handle skunks in ratepayer's traps. Call the office at 982-2010 to report skunks.
